She is involved in tobacco education for Henderson County and works with the West Central School District to keep kids smoke-free. When she is not working at the health department, Erica helps raise cattle at her family farm.



Back-to-School Vaccinations

Back-to-school time is upon us. Without taking the proper precautions, school can be a place where diseases can spread very easily. To keep kids safe, it is important to get kids vaccinated. Vaccinations build resistance to diseases and are vital to keeping kids healthy. Because of this, there are requirements for kids to be vaccinated by certain thresholds in their development to attend public schools. At West Central School District. these are the different vaccination requirements for different age groups: Pre-school and kindergarten students will need Dtap, Polio, Hib, Hep B, MMR, Varicella, and pneumococcal vaccinations. 6th graders will need Tdap, Varicella, and Meningitis vaccinations. 12th graders need to have a meningitis vaccination. 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Breast Cancer Awareness

Women who are 50 to 74 years old and are at average risk for breast cancer should get a mammogram every two years. Women who are 40 to 49 years old should talk to their doctor or other health care provider about when to start and how often to get a mammogram. Breast cancer is common, but can be treated if caught early. Get screened and do self exams. Changes in shape or color, pain or tenderness, and discharge can be a sign to see a doctor.

National Breastfeeding Month

August is National Breastfeeding Month. Breastfeeding babies gives them ideal nutrition that assists in the development and maintenance of a baby's health. Breastfeeding allows a mother to share antibodies with her baby to help them stay healthy. Breastfeeding has been linked to a lower incidence of asthma, obesity, type 1 diabetes, and sudden infant death syndrome. Breastfeeding is also beneficial to the mother and is linked to a reduced risk of breast and ovarian cancer, type 2 diabetes, and high blood pressure.

The WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) program at Henderson County Health Department has resources and personnel that can assist breastfeeding mothers. The WIC Coordinator is trained as a Certified Lactation Specialist, Pediatric Nurse Examiner, Designated Breastfeeding Expert, and Breastfeeding Peer Counselor.
