National Lice Prevention Month

With kids back to school, it is an important time to remind both kids and their parents about the importance of lice prevention. Lice can be incredibly irritating and spread quickly among classmates. However, parents with a quality lice comb can identify and address a case of lice before it develops to the point of needing harsh pesticide shampoos.

When using pesticide shampoos, the pesticide can sometimes kill the living lice but not fully effect the nits (lice eggs). Specialized combs can remove both the lice and the nits at once. Treatments that only kill the lice but not the eggs are likely to be ineffective as more lice will hatch and reinfest. It is important to remove nits and lice from both hair and commonly used soft materials, like bedding, sofas, or clothes.



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Breast Cancer Awareness

Women who are 50 to 74 years old and are at average risk for breast cancer should get a mammogram every two years. Women who are 40 to 49 years old should talk to their doctor or other health care provider about when to start and how often to get a mammogram. Breast cancer is common, but can be treated if caught early. Get screened and do self exams. Changes in shape or color, pain or tenderness, and discharge can be a sign to see a doctor.
