National Breast Cancer Month

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Women who are 50 to 74 years old and are at average risk for breast cancer should get a mammogram every two years. Women who are 40 to 49 years old should talk to their doctor or other health care provider about when to start and how often to get a mammogram. Breast cancer is common, but can be treated if caught early. Get screened and do self exams. Changes in shape or color, pain or tenderness, and discharge can be a sign to see a doctor.

The Illinois Breast and Cervical Cancer Program (IBCCP) offers free mammograms, breast exams, pelvic exams, and Pap tests to residents aged 40-64 in Knox, Warren, and Henderson Counties. Call the Knox County Health Department at 309-344-2224 to make an appointment.



On October 15th, from 2:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., Henderson County Health Department will be hosting a ImpactLife Blood Drive. Blood donors will be able to donate and receive thank you gifts like a Halloween-themed ImpactLife tee-shirt. Blood donation is crucial in the health of people receiving surgeries, undergoing cancer treatment, or recovering from chronic illness or traumatic injury. Donations from O blood types are especially useful as their donation can be used by other blood types as well as people with O blood type. Additionally, donors can choose to have blood products separated, which allows for donation of more of a particular blood product. This could mean donating more red blood cells, platelets, or plasma. Platelets are vital in cancer treatment and organ transplant, and plasma is especially helpful in traumatic injuries.

Farm Equipment Safety

With harvest season underway, it is important to remember some key safety concerns when operating farm equipment. Just like any other motor vehicle, operating farm equipment while tired or under the influence of drugs or alcohol is inadvisable. Reading the manual will give good instructions for safe operation of farm equipment. It may be necessary to alter the equipment for safety. An example of this is installing a **Roll Over Protection Systems** (ROPS). ROPS serve to protect the operator in the case of a rollover incident. The most common form of a ROPS is a bar that goes above the driver from one side to the other. ROPS make the operator much less likely to get crushed under the tractor in a rollover. Operators should also avoid loose clothing, as loose garments can get caught in the machine and potentially lead to injury.
